In other words, exactly the same as the Venetians have done for centuries. The city is the largest car-free area in Europe and has about 400 bridges connecting the 118 small islands on which it was built. These are the cars with the best key ingredients for city life, and some may come as a surprise. For those planning to add a car to their lifestyle, there are essential features to look for. The size is the most obvious, since the routes can be narrow and parking claustrophobic. However, go too small and have no room to carry much more than a laptop. Excellent fuel economy for coping with traffic stop and move is essential, but it's also a cheerful engine. A dense turn radius is also a necessary ingredient, while automatic detection of brakes and pedestrians are huge bonuses, as city life can throw random objects into its path without warning. Automatic folding mirrors are on the wish list for city life, budget permitting, and excellent riding quality for traveling over beaten streets. These are our top choices for large bustling cities with little style, comfort and practicality. The city is where the raised hatchback comes into its own, and Mazda's new CX-30 is one of the best applications of this idea out there. It's small, but there's plenty of room for a weekly shop for two people, and two more in the back. With a naturally aspirated 2.5-litre four-cylinder engine, it produces 186 p.m. and 186-litre torque. The fuel economy is decent but not impressive at 25/33/28 mpg of city/highway/combined cycles. Apple CarPlay and Android Auto are standard, as are i-Activsense i-Activsense safety technologies, which include Smart City brake Support, and there's an acceptable 1.7-metre spin round. The corolla is also surprisingly light (2,850 lbs) and manoevable, although a combined 121 horsepower and 105 lb-ft of torque is not spectacular. The interior is more than acceptable at its price point, while 13.1 cubic meters of cargo volume is perfectly acceptable. Added value comes in the Toyota Safety Sense 2.0 package and includes collision detection, automatic braking, lane departure warning, road sign assistant and adaptive cruise control. Toyota The smallest hybrid SUV available in the premium segment is the Lexus UX, and in its hybrid form, it returns a pleasant 41/38/39 mpg highway/combined. It's a bit of a gem for sneaking through shortcuts into the city and avoiding traffic. It also has a comfortable, if cozy, interior with urban cargo space - meaning a laptop, yoga mat, and a few shopping bags will fit comfortably. The drive system is responsive, screwed and positive, and has a narrow turn circle of 34.2 feet. Apple CarPlay and Android Auto integration, Amazon Alexa and Google Assistant are standard, as well as a pre-collision assistant with pedestrian detection. It's at the higher end of the price spectrum here, but if you're a city-gusher with premium expectations, it's the one you should have. The 2.0-litre engine will only bring you 24/32/27 mpg with automatic gearbox installed, but you'll have fun shooting on side roads and squeezing through traffic. The 36.1-foot turning radius is useful, but the rear seats are meaningless to passengers. The trunk is very usable day to day, and then on the weekend you have a fun car with which to escape the city.
